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Selected books for young people (with crossover appeal to adults*)

*Calabro, Marian. *The Perilous Journey of the Donner Party*. American Library Association Notable Book, Scholastic Book Club selection, and multiple award winner (California Library Association, Virginia Library Association, New York Public Library). “In Calabro’s hands, truth is indeed as spellbinding as fiction.”—*Boston Globe*

Hale, Nathan. *Donner Dinner Party*. A graphic-novel-style retelling; for me, a bit too lighthearted.

Laurgaard, Rachel. *Patty Reed’s Doll*. Intended for 4th graders, this fictionalized account avoids cannibalism.

Lavender, David. *Snowbound*. While this short factual account is well-written, it contains few first-person voices.

Steffoff, Rebecca. *Women Pioneers*. The Donner Party’s Virginia Reed is among the nine female pioneers profiled.

Werner, Emmy E. *Pioneer Children on the Journey West*. Includes diaries, letters, and memories of 120 young pioneers, with a single chapter devoted just to the young people of the Donner Party.

Werther, Scott P. *The Donner Party*. A 48-page book for middle graders.

*Wolf, Allan. *The Snow Fell Three Graves Deep: Voices from the Donner Party*. Hunger is the narrator in this massive (416-page) and impressively organized chronicle.

*Zeinert, Karen, editor. *Across the Plains in the Donner Party*. Primary sources such as Virginia Reed’s writings and Patrick Breen’s diary form the basis of this overview.

Nonfiction books for adults

Bryant, Edwin. *What I Saw in California*. An 1848 account by one of the rescue party leaders.

Hardesty, Donald L. *Archaeology of the Donner Party*

Johnson, Kristin, editor. “Unfortunate Emigrants”: *Narratives of the Donner Party*

Mullen, Frank. *Donner Party Chronicles: A Day-by-Day Account of a Doomed Wagon Train 1846-47*

Rarick, Ethan. *Desperate Passage*

Stewart, George R. *Ordeal by Hunger*. Written in the 1930s, yet still the best overview in some ways.

Wallis, Michael. *The Best Land Under Heaven: The Donner Party and Manifest Destiny*. The most relevant of the contemporary histories, in my opinion.

Lack of records make it impossible to reconstruct a 100% accurate timeline. As author Frank Mullen has noted: "Simple matters, like when or where things happened or who they happened to, become debates. Mileages don't tally. Timetables do not compute." But these efforts are pretty good:
